Summary of School Board activity

The 2020 school year was unlike any that had come before. The impacts of a global pandemic on the wellbeing of all in the school community shifted the focus from business as usual with targeted improvement to coming together to stay safe and connected. Curtin Primary School met he need to quickly pivot to remote learning for all year levels and partnerships between the school and families were strengthened. The impacts of operating a school during a pandemic were far reaching and altered all aspects of school life. While some traditional sources of data, such as NAPLAN and attendance are not present this year, the school has embraced reflection on remote learning. This has allowed us to consider the strengths and challenges for learners and families and Curtin and to develop innovations to enhance the learning experience for all.

The school continued to enhance the learning culture through building cultural integrity, student voice and positive behaviours for learning. In the classroom, core practices in literacy and numeracy were refined to strengthen whole school consistency and differentiation to ensure growth for all learners.

The data contained in the Annual School Board Report provides an opportunity to reflect on the challenges and achievements of all members of our school community in an unprecedented experience.

School Context

Curtin Primary continues in a period of consistent growth in enrolment. In recent years, the school has made incremental improvements to the physical environment, resulting in a modern learning environment.

66 students attend Preschool at Curtin and 470 students are enrolled in the primary years. The overall student population is expected to begin reducing based on the age of the suburb.

The student population is culturally diverse with 47 languages spoken by students at the school. Twelve per cent of students from kindergarten to year six are identified for support as speakers of English as an additional language or dialect (EAL/D). Three per cent of students are identified as Indigenous Australians who each have personalized learning plans that support attendance and academic performance. Five per cent of students are identified with a learning disability and the school is resourced to support their individual learning needs. (Please note the total ILP figure represented below does not include school based ILPs or Gifted ILPs)

Curtin Primary School delivers curriculum through an integrated inquiry approach where collaborative teaching teams, plan and implement learning for each year level cohort.

Teacher qualifications

All teachers at this school meet the professional requirements for teaching in an ACT public school. The ACT Teacher Quality Institute (TQI) specifies two main types of provision for teachers at different stages of their career, these are detailed below.

^{*} If the number of non binary students is less than six, or if gender is unknown, these are randomly assigned 'Male' or 'Female' and included in the counts.

^{**} Language Background Other Than English

- Full registration is for teachers with experience working in a registered school in Australia or New Zealand who have been assessed as meeting the Proficient level of the Australian Professional Standards for Teachers.
- Provisional registration is for newly qualified teachers or teachers who do not have recent experience teaching in a school in Australia and New Zealand. Many teachers moving to Australia from another country apply for Provisional registration.

Workforce composition

Workforce composition for the current reporting period is provided in the following table. The data is taken from the school's verified August staffing report. For reporting purposes, it incorporates all school staff including preschools, staff absent for a period of less than four consecutive weeks and staff replacing staff absent for more than four consecutive weeks. It does not include casuals and staff absent for a period of four consecutive weeks or longer.

The Education Directorate is required to report Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander staff figures. As of June of the reporting period, 135 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander staff members were employed across the Directorate.

School Review and Development

The ACT Education Directorate's Strategic Plan 2018-2021 provides the framework and strategic direction for School Improvement Plans (formerly School Strategic Plans). This is supported by the school performance and accountability framework 'People, Practice and Performance: School Improvement in Canberra Public Schools, A Framework for Performance and Accountability'. Annually, system and school level data are used alongside the National School Improvement Tool to support targeted school improvement, high standards in student learning, innovation and best practice in ACT public schools.

Our school was reviewed in 2018. A copy of the Report of Review can be found on our school website.

School Satisfaction

Schools use a range evidence to gain an understanding of the satisfaction levels of their parents and carers, staff and students. Annually in August/ September ACT schools undertake a survey to gain an understanding of school satisfaction at that time. This information is collected from staff, parents and from 2020 students from year 4 and above (previously year 5 and above) through an online survey.

Overall Satisfaction

In this period of reporting, 85% of parents and carers, 91% of staff, and 75% of students at this school indicated they were satisfied with the education provided by the school.

Included in the survey were 16 staff, 14 parent, and 12 student items which are described as the national opinion items. These items were approved by the then Standing Council on School Education and Early Childhood (SCSEEC) for use from 2015. The following tables show the percentage of parents and carers, students and staff who agreed with each of the national opinion items at this school.

Note: The overall response rate for parents and carers in ACT public schools was negatively impacted by COVID-19, dropping from 31% in 2019 to 23% in 2020.

A total of 35 staff responded to the survey. Please note that not all responders answered every question.

Students in kindergarten undertake an on-entry and on-exit assessment of their early reading and numeracy skills using the BASE program. NAPLAN

Students in years 3, 5, 7 and 9 in all ACT schools participate in the National Assessment Program-Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN). This program assesses skills in reading, writing, spelling, grammar and punctuation, and numeracy.
