School Context

Charnwood-Dunlop School continues to increase enrolments this year. Its current enrolment is 429 students from Preschool to Year 6; This includes two classes in our Belconnen Primary Introductory English Centre (IEC), 78 students in Preschool and two small groups (LSU).

In 2020 we completed our 5-year Improvement Plan and the school went through a review process during term 3. This was an extremely positive process that reflected the growth and development the school community and students have made. We worked closely with our Directorate and school community to shape our next 5-year improvement plan. The three priorities we have focused on are, improving growth in writing across all year levels, improving our growth in numeracy and a focus on building community partnerships that that support our students to be successful members in society.

In 2020 we reviewed our priorities and processes to build and develop our actions moving forward. Our professional learning has shaped and supported our key priority direction, as well as develop our staff wellbeing. This process has supported the staff and greater community to reflect on best practice and develop key initiatives for the future. As a result, our priorities will focus on writing, numeracy, and a greater community involvement. Our Inquiry approach compliments these learning focuses helping to build a comprehensive approach to maximising student learning and therefore continues to be a core element of our pedagogy. We are strategically building our teaching expert base with training in targeted writing workshops, Re-Solve maths and the Inquiry spiral. Our PBL approach remains a fundamental element of our school, embedding these processes into all areas. We will continue to expand these systems into the community as we progress further with this initiative.

Overall our staff movement remains very consistent, retaining nearly all of our staff and continuing to expand. This is an encouraging reflection of the growing positive culture at CDS

Teacher qualifications

All teachers at this school meet the professional requirements for teaching in an ACT public school. The ACT Teacher Quality Institute (TQI) specifies two main types of provision for teachers at different stages of their career, these are detailed below.

- Full registration is for teachers with experience working in a registered school in Australia or New Zealand who have been assessed as meeting the Proficient level of the Australian Professional Standards for Teachers.
- Provisional registration is for newly qualified teachers or teachers who do not have recent experience teaching in a school in Australia and New Zealand. Many teachers moving to Australia from another country apply for Provisional registration.

Workforce composition

Workforce composition for the current reporting period is provided in the following table. The data is taken from the school's verified August staffing report. It does not include casuals and staff absent for a period of four consecutive weeks or longer.

School Review and Development

The ACT Education Directorate's Strategic Plan 2018-2021 provides the framework and strategic direction for School Improvement Plans (formerly School Strategic Plans). This is supported by the school performance and accountability framework 'People, Practice and Performance: School Improvement in Canberra Public Schools, A Framework for Performance and Accountability'. Annually, system and school level data are used alongside the National School Improvement Tool to support targeted school improvement, high standards in student learning, innovation and best practice in ACT public schools.

Our school was reviewed in 2020. A copy of the Report of Review can be found on our school website.

School Satisfaction

Schools use a range evidence to gain an understanding of the satisfaction levels of their parents and carers, staff and students. Annually in August/ September ACT schools undertake a survey to gain an understanding of school satisfaction at that time. This information is collected from staff, parents and from 2020 students from year 4 and above (previously year 5 and above) through an online survey.

Overall Satisfaction

In this period of reporting, 85% of parents and carers, 95% of staff, and 75% of students at this school indicated they were satisfied with the education provided by the school.

Included in the survey were 16 staff, 14 parent, and 12 student items which are described as the national opinion items. These items were approved by the then Standing Council on School Education and Early Childhood (SCSEEC) for use from 2015. The following tables show the

percentage of parents and carers, students and staff who agreed with each of the national opinion items at this school.

Note: The overall response rate for parents and carers in ACT public schools was negatively impacted by COVID-19, dropping from 31% in 2019 to 23% in 2020.
